<u>A reminder:</u> Coaching during championship "A Series" races in all classes is a violation of the Rules. Please be aware that race officials are monitoring all radio channels.

When a Storm Hits

In this part of the country it is not unusual for sailors to encounter the challenges presented by an isolated thunderstorm or a passing weather front. On sailing days it is worthwhile checking the weather forecasts and monitoring the radar web sites. Sail only when the weather is appropriate for your skill level. Review with your crew the drill when a storm is approaching. Be sure to wear your PFD. Dark clouds on the horizon are a signal to be alert. If there is time, sail to the closest pier and lower your sail. If you're too far from shore, lower your sail, keep your hand on the tiller and head down wind to "ride it out". Be aware that the wind can get under the wide expanse of the hull of a scow class boat and capsize the boat even though the sail is down.

When a rescue boat arrives; Pivot the capsized boat into the wind. Slap the bailers shut so no one gets cut. Work to get the boat on her side by loading crew weight on the centerboard or bilgeboard. When the mast and sail are parallel to the water, someone on the rescue boat can unshackle the mainsail and push the mast up. (Vang and cunningham controls will need to be slack to be able to release the halyard. If your scow is capsized, but not turtle, stand on the extended bottom board to get leverage to right the boat. Leave your boat only to board a rescue boat. Phone the YC when you're safely ashore.
