In 1952, the Mr. and Mrs. John S. Pillsbury family established the Edmund Pillsbury Memorial Cup to be awarded annually by the Inland Lake Yachting Association to the skipper of the yacht, irrespective of class, who compiles the outstanding record in the ILYA Annual Championships. In November 2021, the ILYA awarded the Pillsbury Cup to two skippers: Harry Melges IV, Lake Geneva Yacht Club, in recognition of his first overall in Class E in a fleet of 35 boats, and Kent Haeger, Beulah Yacht Club, in recognition of his first overall in Class C in a fleet of 50 boats. Congratulations to Harry IV, the fourth generation in the Melges family to receive this honor. His crew: Finn Rowe, Ripley Shelley, and Finn Burdick.

Message from the Commodore

We had high hopes 2021 would see a return to some sense of normalcy to our LGYC sailing and social programs which were dramatically curtailed in 2020 due to the Covid pandemic. Dealing with the pandemic has been challenging but our LGYC officers, Board, members and staff have done yeoman's work adjusting and adapting to meet our mission.

Fortunately, on the sailing front, our sailors were able to enjoy a full (yet still Covid modified) club racing schedule and participate in many local and national regattas. On the social/food & beverage side, we were compelled to begin 2021 with the modified restaurant restrictions which were instituted in 2020. During these difficult times our goal has been to provide the best service possible in a safe environment for our members and staff. Thankfully, once the summer season began, we were able to open the building and patios with less restrictions. We had a very robust summer dining season which was reflected in sales and members enjoying the club. Our Memorial Day and Independence Day parties drew over 350 people each. We had bands on a stage in the lawn and even served cocktails from the Flagship. Many members told us these were two of the best parties we have had in a long time. We will continue to adapt our food & beverage policies in 2022 to minimize Covid's impact on our members, staff and our operation.

We have much to look forward to in 2022 with a full racing schedule, social activities and hosting the Inland Lake Yachting Association Championship regatta in August (as well as 2023). We will also continue planning for our sesquicentennial celebration in 2024. There is much to be done for all these important events and many volunteers will be needed to ensure first-class experiences.

When our members receive honors we as a club are also honored. Such was the case last October when Jane Wiswell Pegel was inducted into the National Sailing Hall of Fame in recognition of her sailing achievements, her years of leadership within the Geneva Lake Sailing School, her service as LGYC Chief Judge, and the contributions she has made to the sport at the national level. Her official certificate graces our Yearbook cover and is on display in the club.

Finally, I would like to recognize and thank Retiring Commodore John DeCarlo for his steady leadership as we navigated these challenging times through the Covid pandemic. The Executive Committee, Board and staff had many difficult discussions and decisions which impacted our membership, staff and club. John's wisdom and guidance were vitally important at the helm, and we are pleased to dedicate our 2022 Yearbook to him in appreciation.

The 2022 Yearbook is dedicated to John DeCarlo, MD Commodore, 2019 - 2021

Commodores expect challenges, but few commodores in our recent history have been faced with the serious issues that confronted John DeCarlo after only a few months in office.

In January 2020, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention identified the first US case of the Covid-19 coronavirus – a disease with the potential to infect entire populations. Commodore DeCarlo and the club leadership studied the evidence, convened an *ad hoc* Medical Advisory Committee to assist in making recommendations, and created a plan to protect employees and members. Safety was key. In the pandemic’s early months, social gatherings were cancelled, meetings became virtual, curbside food pick-up replaced dining-room service, buildings were closed or had limited access in keeping with state and federal regulations, and race-management procedures were redesigned to reduce personnel and protect participants. Mask-wearing, hand-sanitizing, and social-distancing became the rule. Today, more than two years later, the club continues to adjust its protocols in keeping with CDC guidelines, local health information, and common sense.

“The Covid-19 pandemic was notable early for the cooperation displayed by the Lake Geneva Yacht Club Executive Committee, the Board of Directors, and our membership,” said Commodore DeCarlo, who is Chief of Ophthalmology at Milwaukee’s St. Joseph’s Hospital and a corneal transplant surgeon there and at St. Luke’s Medical Center.

“Together, we altered our activities and complied with a rigid set of club regulations aimed at mitigating spread of a new virus. We still managed to have a full sailing season with a modified social program that kept members and staff safe,” he said. “For this level of cooperation and compliance, I am most grateful.”

John DeCarlo has been a competitor and volunteer at the Yacht Club ever since he and his wife Kathy became members forty years ago. Initially, he crewed on an E-scow then bought the first of the four C-boats he has owned, serving as Fleet Representative and as chair of the 1989 and 1990 Class C North American Championship. He also has crewed for Frank Davenport in both the E and the Melges 24, and last fall he bought an MC that he will race in 2022.

His contributions as a volunteer are diverse and numerous. He was elected to the Board of Directors for three-year terms in 1990, 2003, and 2010, but in 2011 was

appointed Secretary. He held that position until 2016, when he was elected Rear Commodore then Vice Commodore in 2017 and Commodore in 2019, each with committee responsibilities.

Before, during, and since those years, he has chaired the Social Committee, the House and Food Committee, and the Publications and Communications Committee. He has been or is a member of the Long-Range Planning Committee, the Operations Committee, the Membership Committee, and the History and Archives Committee. He has created yearbooks and enhanced our website with memorable photographs of racing and social events; and during the Gala in 2015, celebrating the opening of the new facilities, the DeCarlos worked tirelessly. As Retiring Commodore, John continues as a member of the Executive Committee. Kathy's contributions include her terms as chair of the Junior Activities Committee; the Clothing, Gifts, and Accessories Committee; and membership in the House, Grounds, and Waterfront Committee.

In 2010, John and Kathy received the Marie Kramp Award, a prize that recognizes members for outstanding service. Kathy received the Sherman Trophy in 2011 in recognition of her years of loyalty and commitment to the club.

During their forty years of activities at the club there have been memorable moments. One had its start in 2016 when Kathy and then Rear Commodore John worked with Club Manager Michael Moore to uncrate and prepare 1,000 plants for installation in a barren clearing across from the club's main entrance. With the help of many volunteers, they created a natural rain garden that took root, thrived, and has since become a visual success.

In appreciation for John DeCarlo's leadership and vigilance as Commodore and for his decades of work on our behalf, we are honored to dedicate the 2022 Lake Geneva Yacht Club Yearbook to him as an expression of our sincere thanks.

History of the Lake Geneva Yacht Club

The Yacht Club Begins

In August 1874, residents of the Wisconsin town of Geneva (as it was then known) and elsewhere on Geneva Lake welcomed Lieutenant General Philip H. Sheridan, the famous Civil War army officer, who since 1869 had been stationed in Chicago as commander of the Department of the Missouri and who in 1871 had coordinated military relief efforts during the Great Chicago Fire.

To celebrate his stay, General Sheridan's hosts selected August 31 for a yacht race named in his honor, and they raised \$200 by popular subscription for an appropriate trophy. The actual Sheridan Prize, designed and built by the Chicago firm of Giles Bro. & Co., would not be completed for more than a year, but the promise of an annual competition with its elegant award was enough to generate great interest and lay the groundwork for establishing a yacht club.

According to the Lake Geneva Herald, the excitement surrounding the inaugural race "was of the keenest kind." The fleet consisted of seven boats of various lengths known as sandbaggers, and the newspaper described the course as "a double triangular race, being 3 miles South from Whiting House pier, then 2 miles East into Button's Bay, then North to the place of starting, then repeat, being nearly 16 miles, besides tacking." General Sheridan observed the race from the judges' boat. The winner on corrected time was the 21-foot topsail sloop Nettie, sailed by Billy Woods, master of a local passenger and freight schooner. Nettie's owner was Julian Sidney Rumsey, a pioneer Chicagoan, successful grain merchant, past mayor of the city, and a founding member and former president of the Chicago Board of Trade. Newspapers reported that Nettie's victory was greeted with "great cheering by friends and screeching of steam whistles."

On April 29, 1876, the year of the nation's centennial, a small group of boat owners and enthusiasts gathered at the Whiting House, the popular hotel at the foot of Broad Street, to establish what they initially called the Geneva Lake Yacht Club. Those present adopted a constitution and bylaws, determined sailing rules and regulations, enrolled 18 yachts, elected more than 40 members, and chose Chicago industrialist Nathaniel Kellogg Fairbank as their first commodore. They also memorialized the year 1874 not only as the date of the first Sheridan Prize Race but as the official founding date of the new club.

In May, the Geneva Lake Yacht Club elected 16 more members, one of whom was General Sheridan, and in August the club held the Sheridan Race for the first time under its auspices and rules. The winner was Geneva, owned by General A. C. Ducat, and General Sheridan presented the new trophy, a handsome and detailed 10-inch sterling silver model of the sandbagger Nettie.

In 1891, the Yacht Club reorganized and was incorporated in 1894 under its new name, the Lake Geneva Yacht Club. In 1902 (some accounts say earlier), it merged with the West End Yacht Club based in Fontana.

Early Boats, Scows, and the Classes Today

Sailing craft on Geneva Lake in the late 1800s varied in length and rig, but most were called sandbaggers – broad-beamed, open, shallow-draft sloops that had evolved from workboats. Sandbaggers carried huge spreads of canvas and 50-pound sandbags for ballast that the crew shifted with each tack. According to one early report, most boats sailed with a “plucky” crew of ten or more, known for their “skill, courage, genius, alertness, and agility.”

By 1895, the Lake Geneva Yacht Club’s fleet included nine 25-foot sandbaggers, fourteen 21-foot sandbaggers, four 18-footers, twelve 15-footers, several “less strenuous” catboats in the 15- to 25-foot range, 11 steamers, and two launches. By the end of the decade, however, the design scene on Geneva Lake had changed drastically as the sandbagger type was pushed to near extinction by the Inland Lake Yachting Association’s longer, narrower, lighter boats that were easier to handle, required fewer crew, and, as one writer expressed it, were “balanced to a nicety.”

At a Yacht Club meeting on August 21, 1899, the Sheridan Prize trustees, who govern the event, adopted a new rule for the Sheridan Prize Race stating that all boats in the competition must be classified as Class A within the Inland Lake Yachting Association rules. Five Class A boats (sometimes called 20-footers for their measurement rating) showed up for the 1899 Sheridan, and Benjamin Carpenter and his fellow owners, sailing their gaff-rigged centerboarder Algonquin, were the first to win the Sheridan Prize in a scow. Since then, the Sheridan Prize Race has been held in the 38-foot Class A except from 1975 through 1978, when the A fleet was all but dormant and the trustees invited the 28-foot Class E to race.

In March 2013, the Sheridan Prize trustees added an amendment to the Trust Agreement of 1969 and stated that the race shall be sailed in One-Design Class A Scows as defined by the National Class A Scow Association. They also clarified eligibility requirements and defined the course: a start at the Yacht Club with the fleet sailing a windward course, if possible, to either Fontana or Lake Geneva, then to a mark at the other end of the lake, then to the Yacht Club to finish.

In 2016, the Sheridan Prize Trustees honored the request of Charles Colman to race his new replica sandbagger Tattler II, named for the winner of the Sheridan Prize Race in 1892. Colman’s boat and her plucky crew completed the course, crossing the finishing line after the A-boats to great cheering and applause.

Sailboats on Geneva Lake have undergone numerous refinements since 1902, when bilge boards and double rudders came into widespread use. New classes

differed from one another primarily in length and sail plan. Of the two original ILYA classes, A and B, the 32-foot Class B disappeared in about 15 years. By the mid-1920s, the classes racing at the Yacht Club were the 38-foot A, the 28-foot E (new on the scene and “bound to become very popular”), the 20-foot C (sanctioned by the ILYA in August 1905 to race in 1906), and the 24-foot centerboard sloop called Class X, which disappeared from the roster by the end of the decade. During the years that followed the gaff rig lost popularity, hiking straps replaced the need to “ride the boards,” and materials and techniques evolved as builders and sailmakers continued to experiment.

The Yacht Club’s calendar today includes fleet races for Class A, Class E, Class C, Class MC, Melges 24, Melges 15, Melges 14, Class X (a junior boat, known initially as a Cub), and the Optimist Dinghy. A popular new competition that started in 2018 is the Women on the Water program, a joint effort with the Geneva Lake Sailing School, which supplied its 23-foot Sonars for the series. LGYC racing schedules may also feature national championships, invitational regattas, and the multi-class ILYA Annual Championship. On the last Saturday in August, if conditions permit, the Yacht Club holds the annual Sheridan Prize Race.

The Inland Lake Yachting Association

In January 1898, delegates from 17 clubs in Illinois, Indiana, Minnesota, and Wisconsin met in Milwaukee and established the Inland Lake Yachting Association (ILYA). Its purpose was to “encourage and promote yachting and interlake racing on the inland lakes of the West under uniform rules of measurement, classification, racing, and sailing.” The new organization formulated a set of rules for two classes to race without handicap, which fostered the rapid development of scows. The Lake Geneva Yacht Club is an ILYA founding member (i.e., a participant at the organizational meeting at the White Bear Yacht Club in Minnesota in 1897) and a charter member (a participant at the Milwaukee meeting in 1898).

In the early years of the ILYA, only one boat from a class in each of the member clubs could compete in the Annual Championship Regatta, which after 1902 was to be held only at Oshkosh. In 1905, so that more boats could compete on a variety of lakes, eight yacht clubs in southeastern Wisconsin and northern Illinois formed the Northwestern Regatta Association (NRA), which adopted the specifications of the ILYA scows but allowed unlimited entries for its own annual regatta. The first three Northwestern regattas were sailed on Geneva Lake. In 1913, the president of the ILYA and the commodore of the Northwestern Regatta Association was Dr. Otto L. Schmidt, a trustee of the Lake Geneva Yacht Club and its past commodore. He and others sought to consolidate the ILYA and the NRA, and after the joint regattas of 1915 in Oshkosh and discussions “to consider the advisability of such a union” the two organizations merged in 1916.

In the mid-1930s, the ILYA oversaw the development of a boat for young sailors, which became the popular 16-foot Cub. In 1940, the Lake Geneva Yacht Club was

host to the ILYA's first Cub championship regatta. At its 1947 meeting, the ILYA changed the boat's name from Cub to Class X.

For more than 100 years, the Inland Lake Yachting Association and its Annual Championship Regatta have been central to the enjoyment of the sport for LGYC sailors. The ILYA fostered the design of local scow classes, established these classes as the area's primary racing boats, oversaw development of non-scow types, and today continues to govern and promote competition and encourage excellence in training and race management throughout its member clubs. Since 1900, the Lake Geneva Yacht Club has hosted the ILYA Annual Championship 18 times. (To access ILYA racing records, visit the Inland's website, www.ilya.org)

Geneva Lake Sailing School

In the late 1930s LGYC officers decided that the Yacht Club should offer young people regular well-designed educational programs on sailing technique, seamanship, and safety. In 1938, with the encouragement of Commodore A. F. Gartz Jr. and Secretary-Treasurer and Past Commodore Ernst C. Schmidt, the Yacht Club hired Jerome Kiple as the first instructor of the Lake Geneva Yacht Club Sailing School, and in 1939 the club hired George Herbert Taylor for the post. Taylor, who had been a member of the US water polo and breaststroke teams at the 1920 Olympic Games in Antwerp, used his own A scow and a rejuvenated Marconi-rigged 24-foot Class X centerboarder for instruction. By the end of the season, Taylor had 40 students, and the Yacht Club bought additional boats for the program and received others as gifts.

Many members were active participants in the ongoing progress of the Sailing School, and Ernst Schmidt continued to play a critical role in its positive development with his counsel, help, and financial support. In 1953, with the guidance of attorney William H. Freytag Sr., the School reorganized and was incorporated as the Geneva Lake Sailing School, Inc., and the Yacht Club and the Sailing School became separate but supportive entities. In 1991, the Sailing School's office and classrooms moved to a small building just west of the Yacht Club. In the summer of 2015, the Sailing School and the Yacht Club moved into new premises, with the first floor of the shared facility devoted to Sailing School activities in space designed to enable its programs to flourish.

Thanks to the teaching skills of many instructors and directors and the efforts of dedicated boards of directors, today's Geneva Lake Sailing School is a respected community resource that provides quality sailing education and diversified programs for children, high-school students, and adults. The staff includes full-time executive director Marek Valasek, who represented Slovakia in the Finn Class at the 1996 Olympics, and coaches and certified instructors who oversee beginning and intermediate sailing camps. In 2016, GLSS launched the Buddy Melges Racing Team program to promote youth sailing at local, regional, national, and international levels in the Optimist Dinghy and other classes. The GLSS fleet includes

prams, Optimist Dinghies, Club 420s, Class X, O'pen Bics, Windsurfers, Melges 14s, Melges 15s, Sonars, MCs, Lasers, and powerboats for the coaches.

Flagships

Race Committee boats have been essential in conducting the Yacht Club's busy racing schedule, and most of the early boats used for this purpose were owned by members. The club bought its two most recent boats specifically for Race Committee duty. The first of these, delivered in 1941 and named Flagship, was 24 feet overall and built by the Lyman Boat Works in Sandusky, Ohio. The current Race Committee boat, launched in 1978, is Flagship II, a fiberglass Wasque 26 lobster-boat design built by Vineyard Yachts Inc., in Vineyard Haven, Massachusetts.

Excellence in Sailing and Service

In the years since 1874, the membership of Lake Geneva Yacht Club has progressed from a small group of boat owners, many of whom used professional crews aboard their sandbaggers, to a membership with an impressive record of successful competition at local, regional, interscholastic, intercollegiate, national, and international levels, including the Pan American Games, the Olympic Games, and the America's Cup. Each year, the Awards and Trophies section of the yearbook records the achievements of those who have excelled during the previous year. The club's history is rich with the names of the men and women who continue to inspire us with their sailing ability and for their volunteer service to the sport at every level. A record of those members' names and their awards is planned for the LGYC website.

Clubhouses and the Buddy Melges Sailing Center

With the consolidation of the Lake Geneva Yacht Club and the West End Yacht Club and a combined membership of more than 100, the time was right to construct a clubhouse. In 1906, Kellogg Fairbank, the son of the first commodore, N. K. Fairbank, and commodore himself in 1890, agreed to lease property he owned at Cedar Point to the Yacht Club for \$500 a year. To support the project, members subscribed to a building fund. "The season of 1906 holds promise of being the most successful and enthusiastic in the history of the Lake Geneva Yacht Club," stated text in the yearbook. "The year marks the first in the history of our own clubhouse, a home which is the culmination of great labor and many disappointments in the past, and now the strong factor in the future of the club. Its ideal location on Cedar Point, assures us the support of every resident on the lake, a spot which could not have been better chosen in its neutrality to everyone's interests." The new two-story building, set on the lakefront in wooded surroundings, featured generous verandas and some sleeping accommodations. Toward the end of the lease, Yacht Club officers requested changes to the financial arrangement, but their negotiations were unsuccessful. In 1916, Kellogg Fairbank chose not to renew the Yacht Club's lease on the property. The members moved out of the building, fleets held races from members' piers, and the club was homeless for the next decade.

In 1926, members identified property in Linn Township, directly across the lake from the mouth of Williams Bay, and formed a holding company, the Yacht Club Corporation of Lake Geneva, to raise sufficient capital for the purchase and improvements. The corporation renovated the two-story “modest residence” that had been built in 1878, leased it to the Yacht Club for \$800 a year, installed piers, slips, and other facilities, and in 1927 on the west side of the property built the Geneva Lake Boat Repair and Storage Company (renamed the Geneva Lake Boat Company in 1931). In 1941, for financial reasons, the stockholders of the Yacht Club Corporation of Lake Geneva voted to conclude its affairs, and the mortgage holder, Ernst C. Schmidt, secretary and treasurer of the Lake Geneva Yacht Club, assumed ownership. The Yacht Club continued to lease the property. In the 1960s, the Geneva Lake Boat Company bought the property it had been leasing from Ernst Schmidt, a purchase that included the Yacht Club. In 1967, at the end of their lease with the Boat Company, the Yacht Club and Sailing School constructed a two-story building on land donated to the Sailing School by Honorary Commodore Schmidt. The building, just east of the Boat Company, had a total enclosed area of 4,310 square feet plus a partial basement and crawl space. The property had approximately 112 feet of lake frontage and extended from the lake to South Lake Shore Drive. The new combined clubhouse and school was ready in time for the 1969 season. The Yacht Club leased its facilities from the Sailing School.

In 1974, the Lake Geneva Yacht Club celebrated its centennial and published a commemorative book on its history, edited by Harold S. Hamlin Jr. The club also hosted the ILYA Annual Championship Regatta; its racing sailors and Mike Kurzawa donated six centennial crew trophies to the ILYA; and it held the 100th Sheridan Prize Race on August 31, “the great race of our Club,” as it had been described decades before.

In 1988, to protect their limited lakefront and create a family-oriented sailing center as a legacy for the 21st century, Sailing School and Yacht Club members took “a bold step into the future” and voted to buy the buildings and property of the Geneva Lake Boat Company, which included approximately 148 feet of lake frontage. In the fall of 1989, Past Commodore Thomas A. Lothian and Sailing School President Michael H. Sherin, both members of the LGYC board of directors, organized fellow volunteers and devoted thousands of hours to improvements on the property. (So industrious were Tom Lothian and Mike Sherin that members affectionately called them the T & M Construction Company.) The work included a new seawall, two new hoists, a launching ramp, landscaping, and the removal of the exterior of the boat company’s large blue metal building. Its interior office partitions, plus a new roof, siding, and fittings, became the Sailing School office and classrooms in 1991. In 1996, the Geneva Lake Sailing School and the Lake Geneva Yacht Club agreed to transfer the ownership of the property from the Sailing School to the Yacht Club, contingent upon a new lease, which was signed by both parties in 2002.

In 2013, the members and Boards of Directors of the Lake Geneva Yacht Club and the Geneva Lake Sailing School approved plans for the construction of a new shared facility. The agreement between the two organizations regarding the use, operation, and financial viability of the proposed and existing facilities on the property was signed in January 2013 by Thomas Freytag, as President of the Geneva Lake Sailing School, and John D. Simms Jr., as Commodore of the Lake Geneva Yacht Club. The agreement called for the Yacht Club to retain ownership and management of the property and for the Sailing School to construct and own the building, leasing part of it to the club. Construction began in October 2014 soon after the September demolition of the main Yacht Club and Sailing School buildings.

The new facility contains approximately 12,000 square feet of space: the Sailing School and its six indoor and outdoor classrooms occupy the first floor and the Yacht Club and its social areas, office, dining room, and trophy and photographic displays are on the second floor. An upstairs deck provides more than 3,000 additional square feet of space.

The entire property, which consists of the Lake Geneva Yacht Club, the Geneva Lake Sailing School, and approximately eight acres of land and structures from South Lake Shore Drive to the lakefront and between the east and west boundaries, has been designated the Buddy Melges Sailing Center in honor of Yacht Club member and former Sailing School student, instructor, and president, Harry C. “Buddy” Melges Jr., one of the world’s most accomplished and respected sailors.

Articles of Incorporation of the Lake Geneva Yacht Club, Inc.

These Articles of Incorporation of the Lake Geneva Yacht Club, Inc., duly adopted pursuant to the authority and provisions of Chapter 181 of the Wisconsin Statutes, replace the existing Articles of Incorporation and any amendments thereto.

ARTICLE I - NAME

The name of the corporation is Lake Geneva Yacht Club, Inc. ("Club").

ARTICLE II - PURPOSES

The Club is organized and shall be operated primarily for the enjoyment and support of the sport of sailboat racing by Club members, their families, and guests. Notwithstanding any other provision of these Articles, the Club shall not carry on any activities not permitted to be carried on by a corporation exempt from federal income tax under Section 501(c)(7) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended. To accomplish these purposes, the Club shall conduct races and regattas; shall train members for service on race committees and protest committees and for other race management duties; shall provide buildings, grounds, and equipment to support the Club's programs; shall encourage compliance with recognized principles of sportsmanship and fair play; shall encourage a spirit of volunteerism among members in support of the Club's programs; may teach sailing and racing; may promote and support development and study of the history of the Club and sailing on Geneva Lake; may foster and promote understanding of environmental responsibility; and may provide for other activities related to the Club's purposes.

ARTICLE III - MEMBERS

Categories of membership, rights and responsibilities of members, and other provisions concerning membership shall be stated in the Club's Bylaws.

ARTICLE IV - BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Corporate powers shall be exercised by a Board of Directors in conformity with policy established by the membership. The authority and responsibilities of the Board, including direction of the management of the affairs of the Club, shall be stated in the Bylaws. The Bylaws shall also state the number of Directors and the manner in which they shall be elected.

ARTICLE V - REGISTERED AGENT

The name and address of the registered agent and registered office of the Club at the time of the adoption of these Articles of Incorporation is Michael K. Keefe, 1250 South Lake Shore Drive, Fontana, Wisconsin 53125.

ARTICLE VI - PRINCIPAL OFFICE

The principal office of the Club at the time of the adoption of these Articles of Incorporation is 1250 South Lake Shore Drive, Fontana, Wisconsin 53125.

ARTICLE VII - DISSOLUTION

The Club may be dissolved or merged with another organization only upon the affirmative vote of at least two-thirds of the entire membership of the Board of Directors and also the affirmative vote, at a Regular or Special Membership Meeting, of at least two-thirds of the members present or represented by proxy and eligible to vote. Written notice of the meetings of the Board and of the Club

membership at which dissolution or merger will be discussed shall be mailed to each member at least 30 days before the meeting. Upon dissolution, the Board shall pay the Club's liabilities and dispose of its assets to support the Club's purposes, or transfer them to another organization or organizations having the same or similar purposes as those of the Club.

ARTICLE VIII - ADOPTION, AMENDMENT, OR RESTATEMENT OF ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OR BYLAWS

Articles of Incorporation may be adopted, and these Articles of Incorporation may be amended or restated at a Regular or Special Membership Meeting upon the affirmative vote of at least two-thirds of the members present or represented by proxy and eligible to vote. The Club Bylaws may be amended only as provided in those Bylaws.

CERTIFICATE

This is to certify, pursuant to Section 181.1006(8) of the Wisconsin Statutes, that the foregoing Articles of Incorporation contain amendments to the Club's Articles of Incorporation requiring approval by the members. The members adopted the Articles of Incorporation on September 5, 2009, in accordance with Section 181.1003 of the Wisconsin Statutes.

Bylaws of the Lake Geneva Yacht Club, Inc.

These Bylaws should be read in conjunction with the Articles of Incorporation of the Lake Geneva Yacht Club, Inc.

ARTICLE I - BURGEE

The distinguishing flag of the Club shall be a triangular burgee with three vertical stripes of equal width colored alternately black, red, and black.

ARTICLE II - MEMBERSHIP

Section 1 Qualifications Persons interested in the purposes and activities of the Club may apply for membership.

Section 2 Application An application for membership must be in writing and submitted to the Membership Committee for evaluation and then to the Board of Directors for consideration. Applications are subject to any maximum membership limit or other requirements established by the Board. Approved applicants will then enter an affirmation period after which the Board will vote on whether to reaffirm the membership in compliance with review criteria. Before the Board's reaffirmation decision, two persons who are Regular, Senior, Intermediate, Honorary Life or Honorary Service members must sign the application. Reaffirmation requires that the applicant be in good standing in compliance with Club policies.

Section 3 Membership Categories Membership categories are Regular, Senior, Intermediate, Junior, Honorary, Nonresident, Crew, Military Service, and Associate, and Off-Season Dining.

Section 4 Member's Family Membership in the Club, together with appropriate privileges, shall be considered joint for persons married or in civil union and shall extend to their unmarried children who are less than 26 years of age on January 1st of the calendar year. This applies to a Regular, Senior, Intermediate, Junior, Honorary, Nonresident, and Associate Member.

As a joint membership, there shall be (a) one account number, one seniority membership number, and joint responsibility for charges, fees and dues, and (b) one-member status for any allocated facility. Dues level shall be determined by the age of the older member and, as applicable in movement between membership categories, the length of the membership of the older member.

Section 5 Membership Category Definitions

Regular Member: a member of any age who is currently participating as an owner, regularly helming or regularly crewing or has historically participated in a sailing program, or regularly serving on the Race Committee.

Senior Member: a member who has reached or will reach the age of 65 before January 1 of the current year and has been a Club member in the combined membership categories of Regular, Intermediate and/or Junior for at least 25 years.

Intermediate Member: a member who is currently participating in the sport of sailing and has reached or will reach the age of 21 before January 1 of the current year and is not more than 32 years of age.

Junior Member: a member who is currently participating in the sport of sailing and will not reach the age of 21 before January 1 of the current year.

Honorary Service Member: a member with a record of service to the Club on whose behalf a petition with a résumé of that person's service has been signed by three Regular or Senior Members, submitted to the Board and approved by two-thirds of the Board Members present. No application for the membership is required. Honorary Service Members shall be limited to ten, exclusive of Honorary Life Members. An Honorary Service Member shall not be liable for initiation fees, dues or assessments.

Honorary Life Member: Effective 05/28/2016, the surviving spouse of a Commodore, Vice Commodore, Rear Commodore, or Senior Member who has been a member for 25 consecutive years. No application for the membership is required. An Honorary Life Member shall not be liable for initiation fees, dues or assessments. The rights and privileges of then-existing Honorary Life Members shall be maintained.

Non-Resident Member: a member who does not have a residence within a 150-mile radius of the Club. No further applications for this category shall be accepted after 05/28/2016. The rights and privileges of then-existing Non-Resident Members shall be maintained.

Crew Member: a person who is granted a temporary Crew Membership for a time determined by the Board in order to compete in a US SAILING or other event for which membership is required, or for another approved purpose.

Military Service Member: a member in good standing serving on active duty in the military forces of the United States of America and normally unable to participate in the activities of the Club. The member will be exempt from payment of dues and assessments while on active duty and during the remainder of the year in which such duty is completed.

Associate Member: a member desiring to participate in the activities of the Club and to support its purposes and who may develop an interest in competitive sailing. This category of membership may be limited by the Board of Directors to a percentage of the Club's membership.

Off-Season Dining Member: individuals who have expressed interest in the purposes and activities of the Lake Geneva Yacht Club may apply for an Off-Season Dining Membership, valid between October 1st and April 30th. This category may be limited by the Board of Directors to a percentage of the club's membership. Yearly reapplication and approval is required.

Section 6 Change of Membership Category

A member's request for a change of membership category shall be submitted to the Membership Committee for consideration and recommendation to the Board for approval. An Associate Member may request a change to Regular membership by applying as provided in Section 2.

Section 7 Membership Privileges

Regular, Senior, Intermediate, Honorary Service and Honorary Life Members may hold elected office and vote at Club meetings, subject to the limitation of one vote per family at the Membership Meetings described in Article VII. If both members

of a joint Regular, Senior, Intermediate, Honorary Service and Honorary Life membership simultaneously hold elected office and/or participate in Committees described in Article VIII, they may each vote. Regular, Senior, Intermediate, Honorary Service, Honorary Life and Junior Members have full use of the Club as stated below and in the Club Regulations. They may participate in any sailing or social event provided by the Club and will be eligible to receive trophies and other awards, may represent the Club in Inland Lake Yachting Association events or others for which Club membership may be required, may keep boats on the Club premises for a fee determined by the Board, may receive newsletters and notices, and may participate in other activities and make use of other facilities and services that may be provided by the Club. Privileges of Non-Resident and Associate Members are as stated in the Club Regulations.

Section 8 Family Separations

If members become divorced or legally separated, the membership of each person shall continue for the remainder of the current year. Either person may apply for membership to take effect the following year and upon acceptance any initiation fee shall be waived. Upon the passing of a married member or member in a civil union, who is in good standing, the surviving person's membership shall continue including retaining the seniority and the same dues level of their current membership for the remainder of the year. At the beginning of the next calendar year, the surviving person can apply to continue membership in an appropriate membership category following the process in Article II Section 6 Change of Membership Category.

Section 9 Resignation

A single member, one married member or member in a civil union, who are in good standing, may resign by giving written notice to the Secretary, who shall report its receipt to the Board. If the membership account has outstanding dues or other charges, the resignation shall be accepted subject to any conditions placed by the Board on the collection of the unpaid charges.

In the instance that the other married member or member in a civil union wishes to continue membership, they can request to continue membership in the appropriate membership category following the process in Article II Section 6 Change of Membership Category.

Section 10 Suspension or Expulsion

The Board of Directors may suspend any or all privileges of membership or expel a member for violation of any Club Bylaw, Regulation, or other rule, or for unsportsman like conduct or other misconduct that may harm the Club, either materially or in reputation, or that is contrary or harmful to its purposes. Written notice of the meeting of the Board at which such action may be taken shall be mailed or sent electronically to the member at least 30 days before the meeting, and the member shall be given an opportunity to attend and defend himself or herself. A proposal to take such action shall require the affirmative vote of at least two-thirds of the entire membership of the Board.

ARTICLE III - MEMBERSHIP AUTHORITY

The Club membership shall determine the general direction of the Club in conformity with the statement of purposes in the Articles of Incorporation, elect officers and other members of the Board of Directors, and take other action consistent with these Bylaws.

ARTICLE IV - OFFICERS

The officers of the club shall be Commodore, Vice Commodore, Rear Commodore, Secretary, and Treasurer.

Section 1 Commodore

The Commodore is the senior officer of the Club. He or she shall be in overall charge of its general operations and shall chair all meetings of the Club membership, Board of Directors, and Executive Committee. The Commodore shall be an *ex officio* member of all committees named in the Bylaws, make the appointments provided for in the Bylaws, and make reports at Membership and Board meetings. The Commodore or his or her delegate shall represent the Club at meetings of the Inland Lake Yachting Association and other organizations of which the Club is a member.

Section 2 Vice Commodore

The Vice Commodore shall be responsible for the operation and maintenance of the Club's buildings, grounds, and on-shore facilities and equipment, and shall prepare an operating budget for these activities for consideration by the Treasurer, Executive Committee, and Board of Directors. The Vice Commodore shall assist the Commodore in the discharge of his or her duties, represent the Commodore in the latter's absence, and make reports at Membership and Board meetings.

Section 3 Rear Commodore

The Rear Commodore shall be responsible for the arrangement and conduct of all Club activities on the water and the operation and maintenance of Club watercraft, and shall prepare an operating budget for these activities for consideration by the Treasurer, Executive Committee, and Board of Directors. The Rear Commodore shall assist the Commodore and Vice Commodore in the discharge of their duties; represent the Vice Commodore in the latter's absence, or the Commodore and the Vice Commodore in the absence of both; and make reports at Membership and Board meetings.

Section 4 Secretary

The Secretary shall take and maintain an accurate record of the meetings of the Membership, Board of Directors, and Executive Committee; manage Club correspondence; have custody of and preserve all deeds, mortgages, and other documents; oversee the Club's business communications; and maintain all official records including the membership roll, official race results, and inventory and records of the Club's perpetual trophies. The Secretary shall also be responsible for public relations and shall perform other duties normally incumbent upon the office or assigned by the Commodore or Board of Directors.

Section 5 Treasurer

The Treasurer shall be responsible for the financial operations of the Club; prepare the annual budget for consideration by the Executive Committee and Board of Directors; have custody of the funds of the Club; prepare notices of dues, fee assessments, and other charges; pay all bills properly contracted for by the Club; make a full financial report at the Annual Meeting; submit other financial reports to the Board; and perform other duties normally incumbent upon the office or assigned by the Commodore or Board of Directors.

Section 6 Election and Terms of Service

To be eligible for election, a person nominated for office shall have been a Club member for at least three years. Officers shall be elected at the Annual Meeting to

serve one-year terms of service and shall assume the duties of their offices on the day following the Annual Meeting.

Section 7 Vacancies

In the event of a vacancy in the office of Commodore, the Board of Directors shall elect a Past Commodore not currently an officer to be Acting Commodore to perform the duties of the office. In the event of a vacancy in one of the other four offices, the Board shall elect a Club member other than an officer to be an acting officer to perform the duties of the office. An acting officer shall serve until officers have been elected at the next Annual Meeting and have assumed their duties.

Section 8 Removal from Office

The Board of Directors may remove an officer from office for any of the reasons listed in Article II, Section 10. Written notice of the meeting of the Board at which such action may be taken shall be mailed or sent electronically to the officer at least 30 days before the meeting, and the officer shall be given an opportunity to attend and defend himself or herself. The officer may be removed by the affirmative vote of at least two-thirds of the entire membership of the Board.

ARTICLE V - BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Section 1 Authority and Responsibilities

The Board of Directors shall implement decisions made at Membership Meetings; oversee the management of the Club's property, finances, programs, and staff; approve the annual budget; and establish and annually review Regulations concerning the administration of Club programs and other activities in connection with the Articles of Incorporation and these Bylaws. However, except in an emergency that threatens the safety of persons or property, any proposed expenditure of more than \$10,000 not included in the annual budget shall require the affirmative vote of at least two-thirds of the entire membership of the Board. Board members shall actively participate in Club affairs and regularly attend Board and Membership meetings.

Section 2 Membership

The Board of Directors shall have 15 members. Six shall be the five elected officers and the last Commodore who completed his or her last term in office, all of whom shall be *ex officio* members. The other nine directors shall be members elected by the membership. At least nine directors shall be active participants in the Club's sailing program as a helmsperson, crew, judge, or Race Committee member.

Section 3 Meetings of Directors

The Board of Directors shall meet at least quarterly each year. Eight directors shall constitute a quorum for Board meetings. The Commodore may call additional Board meetings that he or she considers necessary, and shall call meetings requested in writing by at least three directors. Written notice of each meeting shall be mailed or sent electronically to the directors at least ten days before the meeting date. Board members may participate in discussions and vote by video or audio conference. Club members may attend Board meetings as observers, except when the Commodore closes the meeting to observers for discussion of personnel, salaries, or other confidential matters. Minutes of Board meetings, except minutes of closed meetings, shall be published regularly and made available to Club members.

Section 4 Election of Directors and Terms of Service

To be eligible for election, a person nominated for membership on the Board of Directors shall have been a Regular, Senior, Intermediate or Honorary Club member, in good standing, for at least three years. Members of the Board who are not officers shall be elected at the Annual Meeting to serve three-year terms of service, and shall assume their duties on the day following the Annual Meeting. Terms shall be staggered so that three directors are elected each year. After serving a full term, a director may not be re-elected or appointed within a period of one year.

Section 5 Removal of Directors from Board Membership

The Board of Directors may remove a director from the Board for any of the reasons listed in Article II, Section 10. If a director fails to attend two consecutive meetings of the Board without prior notice of good cause to the Secretary, four or more members of the Executive Committee may recommend that the director be removed from the Board. At least 30 days before a meeting called to consider removal, notice shall be given to the director concerned, and the director shall be given an opportunity to attend and defend himself or herself. The Board may remove the director from Board membership by the affirmative vote of at least eight members.

Section 6 Vacancies

When a vacancy arises on the Board of Directors among members who are not officers, it may be filled or left vacant by the Commodore at his or her discretion. If left vacant, it shall be filled at the next Annual Meeting for any unexpired term.

ARTICLE VI - NOMINATION OF OFFICERS AND DIRECTORS

Section 1 Nominations by the Nominating Committee

The Nominating Committee shall nominate a member of the Club for each office and Board of Directors membership to be acted on at the Annual Meeting. Nominations shall be posted on the Club Notice Board on or before August 15 with a notice by the Secretary that the nominees are qualified as required by these Bylaws.

Section 2 Nominations by Members

Any ten members of the Club having voting privileges may together nominate other candidates for any office or Board of Directors membership. The nominations shall be signed by the members concerned and posted on the Club Notice Board at least six days before the Annual Meeting. A notice by the Secretary that the nominees are qualified as required by these Bylaws shall be posted before the meeting.

ARTICLE VII - MEMBERSHIP MEETINGS

Section 1 Regular Membership Meetings and Annual Meeting

Two regular meetings of the Club membership shall be held each year, the first in May and the second on the Saturday preceding Labor Day. The latter shall be the Annual Meeting of the Club for the election of officers and directors and the transaction of other business presented. Written notice of each meeting shall be mailed or sent electronically to each member at least 30 days before the meeting.

Section 2 Special Membership Meetings

At the discretion of the Commodore, or upon written request from ten or more members to the Commodore, the Commodore shall call a special meeting of the membership. Written notice of a special meeting, including the time, place, and

agenda, shall be mailed or sent electronically to each member at least 15 days (30 days when Section 4, below, applies) before the meeting.

Section 3 Membership Meeting Quorum

Twenty members of the Club present or represented by proxy at a membership meeting shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. However, any lesser number of members may adjourn the meeting to a fixed place, day, and time, and notice of the adjourned meeting shall be mailed promptly to each member and posted on the Club Notice Board.

Section 4 Voting

Voting at all membership meetings shall be in person, except for instances which in-person meetings cannot be held due to local or national emergencies, as stipulated by the Executive Committee. In the instance of such emergencies, membership meetings can be held by video or audio conference. Voting by mail ballot shall not be permitted. However, voting by proxy shall be permitted to decide on the acquisition or disposal of Club property having a value of \$50,000 or more, or on a matter that the Board of Directors, by the affirmative vote of at least two-thirds of its members present, has decided is appropriate for proxy voting. No member may exercise more than five proxies. The provisions of Section 2 of this Article apply to any membership meeting that will involve proxy voting. The procedure to be followed by a member wishing to authorize another member to serve as proxy is specified in the Club Regulations.

Section 5 Parliamentary Authority and Order of Business

Meetings shall be conducted in compliance with the Club Bylaws or, in matters not covered there, by *Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised*, with the following Order of Business: Call to Order, Approval of Minutes, Reports of Officers, Reports of Committees, Unfinished Business, New Business, Election of Officers, Miscellaneous, and Adjournment.

ARTICLE VIII - COMMITTEES

Section 1 Executive Committee

The Executive Committee shall consist of the five elected officers and the last Commodore who completed his or her last term in office. The committee shall be responsible for the day-to-day operation of the Club and shall implement instructions of the Board of Directors, monitor the activities of other committees and staff, recommend an annual budget to the Board, and regularly monitor compliance with the budget. The committee shall meet as determined by the Commodore. When clearly necessary, the committee may act on behalf of the Board by unanimous vote of all committee members, but only if a special meeting of the Board prior to its next scheduled meeting is not feasible or practical. The action shall be consistent with the Club's purposes and these Bylaws, and the committee shall report it to the Board at its next regular meeting for approval or repeal.

Section 2 Race Committee

The Race Committee shall consist of the Rear Commodore as chairman, a Chief Race Officer appointed by the Commodore on the recommendation of the Rear Commodore, and members appointed by the Chief Race Officer who are qualified to conduct Club races. The committee shall be responsible for the conduct of all Club races and for training and scheduling race management personnel.

Section 3 Judges Committee

The Judges Committee shall consist of the Rear Commodore as chairman, a Chief Judge appointed by the Commodore on the recommendation of the Rear Commodore, and members appointed by the Chief Judge who are qualified to serve as judges. The Chief Judge shall form protest committees, schedule protest hearings as needed, and organize the training of Club members to serve as judges.

Section 4 House, Grounds, and Waterfront Committee

The House, Grounds, and Waterfront Committee shall consist of the Vice Commodore as chairman and members appointed by the Vice Commodore who are qualified for service. The committee shall be responsible for the operation and upkeep of all Club buildings and land-based facilities and grounds, and shall recommend to the Board of Directors rules for use of the Club property by members and their guests.

Section 5 Membership Committee

The Membership Committee shall consist of a chairman and members appointed by the Commodore. The committee shall review all applications for Club membership and transfer between membership categories, and shall forward its recommendations to the Board of Directors for action.

Section 6 Nominating Committee

Before August 1 of each year, the Executive Committee shall appoint and post the names of a Nominating Committee consisting of a chairman and two other members, none of whom shall be Club officers or directors. The chairman and at least one other member shall be active participants in the Club's sailing program as a helmsperson, crew, judge, or Race Committee member. The committee shall nominate a member of the Club for each office and Board of Directors membership for election at the Annual Meeting. The nominations shall be reported to the Secretary in time for posting on August 15 with a notice by the Secretary that the nominees are qualified as required by these Bylaws.

Section 7 Finance Committee

The Finance Committee shall consist of the Treasurer and a chairman and two other members appointed by the Commodore. The committee shall assist the Treasurer in the performance of his or her duties, assist in the preparation of an annual budget, recommend investment policy to the Board of Directors, select outside auditors, regularly review the overall financial condition of the Club, stay informed of governmental regulations that affect the Club's finances, and make recommendations to the Board and Club membership for strengthening the Club's financial condition.

Section 8 Long-Range Planning Committee

The Long-Range Planning Committee shall consist of a chairman and three members appointed by the Commodore. Considering the five- to ten-year period ahead, the committee shall identify potential opportunities and challenges, study alternative courses of action and their potential consequences, develop goals to help guide Club programming and fund-raising priorities, and make recommendations to the Board of Directors and Club membership for action.

Section 9 Social Committee

The Social Committee shall consist of a chairman appointed by the Commodore and members appointed by the chairman. The committee shall plan and organize an annual program of social events for members and visiting sailors who attend

regattas conducted by the Club. The committee shall coordinate planning of social events with fleet captains, regatta chairmen, the Membership Committee, the Geneva Lake Sailing School, and the Club Manager to provide a variety of events for the membership as a whole or for groups of members, and to prevent conflicting dates. The social program should help members become better acquainted, especially new members, and ensure that visiting sailors feel welcome.

Section 10 Publications and Communications Committee

The Publications and Communications Committee shall consist of a chairman appointed by the Commodore and members appointed by the chairman. The committee shall manage the publication of the annual Yearbook and Membership Roster and other publications or printed matter, and oversee the design and content of the Club website, and other Club communications.

Section 11 Trophy Committee

The Trophy Committee shall consist of a chairman appointed by the Commodore and members appointed by the chairman. The committee shall purchase trophies for club racing and regattas organized by the Club; be responsible for the annual maintenance, engraving, and return of trophies owned by the Club; and arrange the display of trophies for presentation at regattas organized by the Club and at the annual Trophy Presentation.

Section 12 History and Archives Committee

The History and Archives Committee shall consist of a chairman appointed by the Commodore and members appointed by the chairman. The committee shall plan and implement systems for the collection, preservation, retention, and storage or display of Club records, photographs, paintings, books, artifacts, and other objects of historical importance or interest, such as governing documents, deeds, minutes, trophy deeds of gift, race results, and important financial records.

Section 13 Merchandise Committee

The Merchandise Committee shall consist of a chairman appointed by the Commodore and members appointed by the chairman. The committee shall arrange with the Club Manager for the acquisition and sale to members of various items of clothing, the Club burgee, and other merchandise of interest to members.

Section 14 Ad Hoc Committees

The Commodore may create ad hoc committees and appoint their members as he or she considers desirable in particular circumstances. In doing so, the Commodore shall prepare a written description of the responsibilities and, when necessary, the authority of the Committee.

ARTICLE IX - FLEET REPRESENTATIVES, COUNCIL, CAPTAIN

Section 1 Fleet Representatives

No later than Labor Day of each year, each one-design fleet, any PHRF fleet, and the Power Fleet shall report to the Commodore the name of one of its members who will be its Fleet Representative. Each representative shall be a member of the Fleet Council and shall serve for one year beginning October 1. The Commodore may appoint a Fleet Representative for a fleet that has not named one.

Section 2 Fleet Council

The Fleet Council shall meet when necessary to discuss matters of mutual interest, make recommendations for Board consideration, and act on decisions

of the Board. Annually before December 31, the Council shall propose to the Rear Commodore the following year's schedule for Club races and any regattas requested by fleets.

Section 3 Fleet Captain

The Commodore shall appoint one member of the Fleet Council to be its chairman and Fleet Captain, to represent the Fleet Council at Board of Directors meetings and to report on fleet activities and other relevant matters at the Annual Meeting.

ARTICLE X - COMPETITION IN CLUB RACES

Section 1 Eligibility

To be eligible to compete in Club races, a boat's helmsperson and owner shall be a Regular, Senior, Intermediate, Junior, Honorary Service or Honorary Life Club member in good standing. A boat failing to comply with this requirement may be disqualified, subject to a hearing, in races sailed when not in compliance, and shall be barred from further competition until in compliance.

Section 2 Registration

A boat owned or controlled wholly or in part by one or more Club members wishing to compete in Club races shall be enrolled in a fleet by being registered with the Secretary. Except with prior approval of the chairman of the Race Committee, an unregistered boat may not compete in Club races or represent the Club in other events.

Section 3 Racing Rules

Club races shall be governed by *The Racing Rules of Sailing* published by World Sailing, the prescriptions of the United States Sailing Association, class rules, and the Club Sailing Instructions.

Section 4 Trophies, Prizes, and Awards

Trophies, prizes, and awards shall be presented in recognition of racing achievement or service to the Club. Perpetual trophies may be donated to the Club if approved by the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE XI - STAFF

Section 1 Executive Secretary

An Executive Secretary may be employed by the Executive Committee upon the recommendation of the Commodore and shall report directly to the Commodore. The Board of Directors shall determine the Executive Secretary's duties and compensation.

Section 2 Club Manager

A Club Manager may be employed by the Executive Committee upon the recommendation of the Vice Commodore and shall report directly to the Vice Commodore. The Board of Directors shall determine the Manager's duties and compensation.

Section 3 Other Staff

Other staff necessary for the Club's operations may be employed within the limitations of the annual budget.

ARTICLE XII - FINANCIAL OBLIGATIONS OF MEMBERS

The financial obligations of members, including initiation fees, membership dues, charges for goods and services purchased from the Club, and penalties for late

payment, shall be as stated in the Club Regulations. Special assessments may be levied on members for specific purposes, but only after being approved at a Regular or Special Membership Meeting by the affirmative vote of at least two-thirds of the members present or represented by proxy and eligible to vote. A proposal to authorize an assessment or to discuss matters that would involve an assessment shall be in writing and mailed to members at least 30 days before the meeting at which it will be considered.

ARTICLE XIII - LIABILITY AND INDEMNITY

Section 1 Liability of Directors and Officers

Except as otherwise provided by law, no director or officer shall be liable to the Club, or any person asserting rights on behalf of the Club, its creditors, or any other person, for damages, settlements, fees, fines, penalties or other monetary liabilities arising from a breach of, or failure to perform, any duty resulting solely from his or her status as a director or officer, unless the person asserting liability proves that the breach or failure to perform constitutes (a) a willful failure to deal fairly with the Club in connection with a matter in which the director or officer has a material conflict of interest; (b) a violation of criminal law, unless the director or officer had reasonable cause to believe his or her conduct was lawful or no reasonable cause to believe his or her conduct was unlawful; (c) a transaction from which the director or officer derived an improper personal profit or benefit; or (d) willful misconduct.

Section 2 Indemnity of Directors and Officers

The Club shall indemnify a director or officer, to the extent he or she has been successful on the merits or otherwise in the defense of any threatened, pending or completed civil, criminal, administrative or investigative action, suit, arbitration or other proceeding, whether formal or informal, which involves foreign, federal, state or local law and which is brought by or in the right of the Club or by any other person, for all reasonable expenses, including fees, costs, charges, disbursements and attorney fees, incurred in the proceeding, provided the director or officer was a party because he or she is a director or officer of the Club, and in all other cases, the Club shall indemnify a director or officer against liability, including judgments, settlements, penalties, assessment, forfeitures, fines, including any excise tax assessed with respect to an employee benefit plan, and reasonable expenses, incurred by the director or officer in the proceeding, provided the director or officer was a party because he or she is a director or officer of the Club, unless the liability was incurred because the director or officer breached or failed to perform a duty he or she owes to the Club and the breach or failure to perform constitutes (a) a willful failure to deal fairly with the Club in connection with the matter in which the director or officer has a material conflict of interest; (b) a violation of criminal law, unless the director or officer had reasonable cause to believe that his or her conduct was lawful or no reasonable cause to believe that his or her conduct was unlawful; (c) a transaction from which the director or officer derived an improper personal profit or benefit; or (d) willful misconduct.

The termination of a proceeding by judgment, order, settlement or conviction, or upon a plea of no contest or an equivalent plea, shall not, by itself, create a presumption that indemnification of the director or officer is not required under this bylaw. No indemnification is required under this bylaw to the extent the officer or director has previously received indemnification, reimbursement or allowance of expenses from any person, including the Club, in connection with the same proceeding. Determination of whether indemnification is required under

this bylaw shall be made by the means provided pursuant to Section 181.0873 of the Wisconsin Statutes.

The Club, by its Board of Directors, may indemnify in a like manner, or with any limitations, any employee or agent of the Club who is not a director or officer with respect to any action taken or not taken in his or her capacity as such employee or agent. The foregoing rights of indemnification shall be in addition to all rights to which directors, officers, employees or agents may be entitled as a matter of law, by resolution of the board of directors, or by written agreement with the Club. All terms used in this Section 5.2 for which a definition is provided in Section 181.0871 of the Wisconsin Statutes and not otherwise herein defined shall have the meaning set forth in said statute.

ARTICLE XIV - FISCAL YEAR

The Club's fiscal year shall be the calendar year.

ARTICLE XV - AMENDMENTS

These Bylaws may be amended only by the membership. A proposal to amend the Bylaws shall be considered at the next Regular Membership Meeting, and the Secretary shall mail or send electronically written notice of the proposal to the membership at least 30 days before the date of the meeting. The Bylaws may be amended only by the affirmative vote of at least two-thirds of the membership in attendance or represented by proxy and eligible to vote.

Regulations Related to Bylaws

ARTICLE II - MEMBERSHIP

Section 3 Membership Categories

The Lake Geneva Yacht Club and the Geneva Lake Sailing School are two separate organizations. Membership in either organization does not automatically imply membership in the other organization.

Section 4 Member's Family

Parents of Junior Members do not enjoy privileges associated with club membership, unless they are members in their own right.

Section 6 Change of Membership Category

Members are able to convert to Regular Membership provided that they have shown an interest in or have historically participated in the sailing program. (See below). The membership request should be submitted through the normal membership application process.

Regular Members are able to convert to a different membership category upon submission of a request to the Membership Committee and approval of that request by the Board of Directors.

Section 7 Membership Privileges

Regular Members

Regular members shall be limited to members who are currently participating or have historically participated in the sailing program by purchasing a sail boat, regularly crewing, or serving on the Race Committee. Regular members shall have voting privileges and shall be eligible to hold office in accordance with the Bylaws. Regular members shall have boat launching privileges, shall be eligible for a boat slip, subject to the regulations below, and to store boats on-site at storage rates set by the Board of Directors. Regular members shall be eligible for preferred car parking and dining reservations as may be provided by the Board of Directors. The Board of Directors may limit the number of Regular members. As of June 6, 2015, that number shall be 175.

Senior Members

Senior membership shall be available to any regular member who applies for such membership and has met the requirements as set forth in the Bylaws. Senior members have voting privileges and shall be eligible to hold office in accordance with the Bylaws. Senior members shall have boat launching privileges, shall be eligible for a boat slip, subject to the regulations below, and to store boats on-site at storage rates set by the Board of Directors. Senior members shall be eligible for preferred car parking and preferred dining reservations as may be provided by the Board of Directors.

Intermediate Members

Intermediate membership shall be subject to the age requirements as set forth in the Bylaws. Intermediate members shall have the all of the privileges of a Regular member except for eligibility for boat slips and preferred car parking.

Associate Members

Associate members shall not have voting privileges, shall not be eligible to hold office in accordance with the Bylaws nor may they act as helmsperson for

an official Club race. Associate members shall not be eligible for a boat slip. Associate members may store boats on-site, subject to availability, at the storage rates set by the Board of Directors. The Board of Directors may limit the number of Associate members. As of December 5, 2015, that number shall be limited to 50% of the voting members at the time any such Associate member may be approved. Associate members shall not be eligible for preferred car parking and dining reservations.

Associate Members shall have boat launching privileges. Associate Members who own a power boat are required to attend LGYC power boating orientation to provide instruction on how to operate a power boat around the Club and while watching races.

Off-Season Dining Member

Off-Season Dining Memberships valid between October 1 and April 30, shall be available to individuals who have expressed interest in the purposes and activities of the Lake Geneva Yacht Club and complete an Off-Season Dining Membership application for approval by the Membership Committee. Off-Season Dining Members shall not have voting privileges nor shall they be eligible to hold office. The Board of Directors may limit the number of Off-Season Dining Members. As of October 1 2018, that number shall be limited to 30% of the voting members at the time any such Off-Season Dining Member may be approved. An Off-Season Dining Member shall be liable for a membership fee set by the Board. If Off-Season Dining Members elect to convert their membership to another membership category they must reapply through the standard application process and will be subject to full initiation fees. The Board of Directors reserves the right to restrict and regulate this category of membership.

Non-resident Members

Non-resident members shall be subject to the residency requirements as set forth in the Bylaws. Non-resident members shall have all of the privileges of a Regular member. Non-resident members shall not be included in “Seniority” with Regular and Senior members, but rather shall be included in a separate category of Non-resident members. No further applications for this category will be accepted effective May 28, 2016.

Geneva Lake Sailing School Instructors

Sailing School instructors have no special benefits regarding membership, boat storage, racing, scoring, or trophies.

Non-members

Non-members may purchase club items.

Boat Launching Privileges

Members using boat-launching privileges must follow the guidelines outlined to all members. The Board of Directors may limit the number of and/or frequency of member boat launching as well as trailer parking and storage. Members must be cognizant of the sailing schedule (i.e. no launching during pre-race rigging, etc.). Launching and docking priority shall be given first to racing sailboats, then pleasure sailboats, and then motor boats. Power yachts shall use only the windward side of the piers and shall not restrict the sailing yachts in any way. Members should obtain and observe the power boating guidelines available through the Club Manager.

ARTICLE V - BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Section 3 Meetings of Directors

Board meetings are open to the general membership. Meeting dates are posted on the LGYC website. Members are welcome to attend.

Section 4 Election of Directors and Terms of Service

Board meeting minutes should reflect attendance as outlined by the Bylaws.

ARTICLE X - COMPETITION IN CLUB RACES

Section 1 Eligibility

Members may petition the Board of Directors to form new fleets. The Rear Commodore may propose dissolution of a fleet when the fleet fails to participate in scheduled races or the number of registered boats in that fleet is less than three.

ARTICLE XII - FINANCIAL OBLIGATIONS OF MEMBERS

All Dues and Fees are determined by the Board of Directors in connection with the approval of the annual budget. Regular, Senior, Associate and Intermediate members are also subject to a minimum annual restaurant charge. Once members have paid their minimum annual restaurant charge they will not be required to commit to any additional restaurant charges that year. For the purpose of membership classification, effective May 28, 2016, ages shall be determined as of January 1 of the current year. Effective January 1, 2016, members shall be billed monthly for 1/12 of the annual dues. New member dues shall be billed and payable following approval of application for membership. Wisconsin sales tax shall be added to all dues and fees.

An Initiation Fee is to accompany Application for Membership for all applicants over age 32. Applicants who were previously members will pay the difference between the current Initiation Fee of the Membership Category for which they are joining and the Initiation Fee(s) previously paid. Members in good standing moving from intermediate to regular membership are not required to pay an additional Initiation Fee. For those under age 32 there is no Initiation Fee. Initiation Fee is waived for surviving spouse following death and for divorced spouse if joining the year following the divorce.

Membership Dues shall be determined and billed as directed by the Board of Directors as noted above. The following guidelines are currently in effect.

Senior Member: Dues are approximately 2/3 of the Regular Member dues.

Intermediate Member: Dues shall be as determined by the Board.

Nonresident Member: Dues are approximately 1/2 of the Regular Member dues.

Junior Member: Dues are approximately 1/5 of Regular Member dues. Payment shall be included with the Application for Membership.

Boat Storage

Storage Fees shall be determined and billed as directed by the Board of Directors. The following guidelines are currently in effect.

Summer and Winter Dry Land Storage

Summer Season (May 1-November 1)

Fees for racing classes shall be based on boat length. Cruise/non-racing boats have a separate fee. If a yacht has multiple owners, all owners must be members. Responsibility for dry land storage charges for a multiple-owner yacht is determined by her owners; i.e., bill one or bill all equally.

For those storing multiple racing boats, the most expensive is charged at full rate, the next most expensive is given a 10% discount, and all others are given a 15% discount.

Partial Season Boat Storage

Mooring charge billed monthly is 50% of Full Season; charges billed weekly are 30% of the monthly charge.

Indoor Summer Boat Storage

Fees are determined as noted above for powerboats with in/out privileges, for non-use storage, for summer trailer storage, and for iceboat storage.

Winter Season (November 1-May 1)

Fees are based on the length of the boat. Outside winter storage is 1/2 the inside storage rate. Boats owned by non-members are charged double the member rate. Winter shore station storage charges for non-members are twice the member rate.

Regulations Relating to Club Boat Slips

The objective of having slips rented at the LGYC is to provide its members with affordable access to Lake Geneva and foster our core objective of competitive sailing. Boat slips will be made available to regular or senior members only, at a fee determined by the Board of Directors on a seasonal basis. 2021 fee is \$4000 plus tax. The Vice Commodore will initially maintain current slips assignment to regular or senior members in good standing who have rented a slip during the previous season. Members renting slips from the previous year will be invoiced in April of each year. All slip fees must be paid and a signed copy of these regulations must be received within 30 days of the invoice date or the slip rental may be forfeited.

If a current slip renter surrenders their slip, they have a one-time option to pay \$500 to be placed on the top of the wait list and remain on the wait list until the next slip becomes available to them. If there is already a member who has surrendered a slip, the second person surrendering will be number two on the list and so forth. If the opportunity to rent the slip is declined, the member may have their name removed from the wait list or pay \$500 to exercise a one-time option to remain on the wait list, in present queue until the next slip becomes available to them. The space will be offered to the next qualified member on the list.

The waiting list will be maintained by the Vice Commodore and the Executive Secretary and will be open only to regular and senior members in good standing. Good Standing: For purposes of this regulation, good standing shall mean the member's account shall not be more than 30 days past due. Members not in good standing may be removed from the wait list and may forfeit their assigned slip.

The maximum boat size is 28 feet and 11,000 pounds. Members are encouraged to put their boats on lifts. Boats weighing over 5,500 pounds and all powerboats

are required to use lifts. All costs associated with lift and platform, procurement, installation, removal, utilities, maintenance and storage are the slip renter's responsibility. Boats not on a lift are required to be properly moored with dock lines, snubbers and spring lines to help minimize damage to the piers. All damages incurred due to inadequate mooring will be billed to the member. No canopies are allowed.

The slip rented by a LGYC member at the LGYC pier is non-transferable. The LGYC slip and the LGYC pier may be used only by the slip-renting member and by said member's guests. If at any time the slip or pier is used for financial gain, it shall result in immediate termination of the use of the LGYC slip by that member. Except for unusual circumstances that are approved in advance by the Vice Commodore, no slip may be occupied by a boat that is not registered in the member's name. Temporary slip mooring arrangements may be permitted by the Vice Commodore for unique circumstances such as regattas and boat shows, etc. Failure to meet the requirements set forth above will result in a written notification to the member. Compliance shall be required within 10 days or the member will be required to forfeit the rented slip and any paid fees. If a member's boat is removed for non-compliance it will be removed at the owner's expense. Approved by Board of Directors on February 1, 2014

Reciprocity

LGYC extends reciprocal privileges to Yacht Club members of clubs that allow the same privileges to our members.

Reciprocal Members must present either their current Club membership card or a letter of introduction from their Club. Once reciprocity is verified, Reciprocal Members may use the facilities 5 times during the season of Memorial Day to Labor Day. Reciprocal Members may charge restaurant, bar, and clothing and shall pay at the time of purchase by credit card. LGYC does not bill back to the reciprocal member's home Club. LGYC reserves the right to restrict and to regulate this privilege.

Membership at the LGYC includes the privilege of visiting other clubs that recognize LGYC as a Reciprocal Club. It is advisable that the LGYC Member contact any club they plan to visit in advance. LGYC Members may charge at Reciprocal Clubs and shall pay at the time of purchase.

Special Member Services

Trophy engraving, US Sailing membership, etc., will be billed to members with no additional surcharges.

Credit Card Payments

Credit cards shall be charged at the time of billing. Statements shall be stamped "Paid by Credit Card."

Intermediate, Non-Resident, Junior and Associate Members are required to have a credit card on file with the Club Office. Credit cards will be charged for any amounts which are 30 days past due.

Accounts Receivable

Terms: Net 30 days: Billing monthly; a late fee of \$25 will be charged each month on any account with a balance over 60 days past due.

After 60 days: Any member whose account is past due 60 days will not be scored in LGYC racing until said account is brought current by payment in full and said member so advises the Treasurer or accountant, who, in turn, shall promptly so advise the scorer. Resumption of scoring is not retroactive.

After 90 days: All “charge” privileges are removed and member will be put on a COD basis and posted as a past due account.

After 120 days: Member will be referred to the Board of Directors for appropriate action. The Board may enter into a payment plan and may require posting of a credit card for all future account charges. The Board may expel the member, pursuant to the Bylaws. Following expulsion, the Board may proceed to collection activities through a collection agency or attorney, as it deems appropriate.

Action may be posted. An account shall not be turned over to a collection agency until a member has been expelled.

LGYC charges to regattas

The Club as a whole should not subsidize specific regattas, which should be self-supporting. A daily rate for the use of the Flagship will be determined by the Board of Directors based on driver’s salary, gas, and maintenance costs. For GLSS regattas, the daily rate is based only on salary and gas. Utility and maintenance charges for the Clubhouse are determined by the Board of Directors.

Authority to Enter Into Various Agreements

When entering into various agreements in connection with the operation of its facilities and related activities, including but not limited to service and maintenance agreements, entertainment, catering, insurance contract and agreements and agreements related to the purchase or improvement of capital assets, the Club Manager, Treasurer, or Commodore are authorized to sign such contracts and agreements to the extent included in the approved annual budget, subject to the following limitations:

The Club Manager is authorized to enter into such contracts and agreements for service and maintenance, catering and entertainment, not to exceed \$1,000 subject to prior approval by the Treasurer. The Treasurer is authorized to enter into any such agreement, not to exceed \$5,000. The Commodore is also so authorized in the absence of the Treasurer. The Commodore and Treasurer are authorized to jointly enter into any contract in excess of \$5,000 but not to exceed \$10,000. Any contract in excess of \$10,000 must be approved by the Board of Directors whether or not it is included in the approved annual budget.

POLICIES RELATED TO HOUSE, GROUNDS, and WATERFRONT RULES

Building Rule - Alcoholic Beverages

All alcoholic beverages will be distributed according to Wisconsin State Statutes.

Grounds Rule 7 - Alcoholic Beverages

No alcoholic beverages will be given away on the last day of a regatta.

Maple Hills Association (property to the east of LGYC)

LGYC and GLSS boats are requested to stay clear of the mooring area at Maple Hills. LGYC may not use Maple Hills pier or bouys for mooring boats. There will be no eating, playing, swimming, etc. by LGYC members or their guests at the Maple Hills pier or elsewhere. Effective September 2016, Maple Hills members may not use the LGYC launch ramp.

OTHER POLICIES

Boat Driver

Boat 2 driver may go out on the water alone.

Trophies

As determined by the Board of Directors and as stated in deeds of gift, some active trophies of historic significance remain at the Yacht Club. Trophies that are inactive or that the Board has retired also reside at the Yacht Club unless otherwise stated in deeds of gift or directed by the Board.

Guest Sailing Policy (Provisional Racing Guidelines)

Guests must be invited to participate in the “Provisional Racing” by an existing LGYC member who is currently in good standing with the membership. Guests may participate in no more than three races per season. Guests must have a discussion with the Fleet Captain prior to their first race to ensure the guest is aware of the “fleet history/status” and to prevent any potential problems of interfering with race series results. Guests will sail with full rights outlined in the LGYC Sailing Instructions (SI), but must “duck out” prior to the finish to avoid any confusion to the LGYC members. Guests shall not be considered in determining minimum fleet size for race scoring as prescribed in SI 17.1. Guests will not be scored for the time he/she is not a member, and shall not be scored retroactively should they join LGYC at a later date.

Sail Number Allocation Procedure

Only members of the Lake Geneva Yacht Club will be assigned “I” (ILYA lake designation) numbers for classes A, E, C, and X (and any other fleets that the ILYA may include in this program.)

Each member may be assigned one number to be used in all fleets. The member must own a boat in one of the designated fleets. If a member owns more than one boat in any fleet, additional numbers may be assigned for that fleet only.

Numbers may be loaned on an annual basis if the member loaning the number agrees in writing to the Secretary (on the LGYC Board of Directors) or the Executive Secretary. The LGYC office will maintain a record of number assignments and waiting list for number assignments.

If the member does not own and race a boat in any of the designated fleets for a period of five years, the number automatically will be released or assigned to the next person on the waiting list.

If a member has been inducted into the National Sailing Hall of Fame, the member may ask that their number be held for use by their direct descendants or retired from use.

If the membership is discontinued for any reason, the number that it held will become available first to any active membership that is a direct descendent of the discontinued membership, then to other memberships on the basis of the waiting list. This policy is retroactive for four years; i.e., if a yacht has not raced during the past four years, she may race in the fifth year to retain her number.

HOUSE RULES

House Rules enable members of the Lake Geneva Yacht Club (LGYC) and Geneva Lake Sailing School (GLSS) to fully enjoy our facilities with minimum

inconvenience to themselves, other members, and our neighbors. Please bring these rules to the attention of your family and guests. The conduct of family members and guests is the responsibility of the member. Everyone's cooperation is expected and appreciated.

1. Club hours will be posted on the Official Notice Board.
2. The LGYC and the GLSS will not be held responsible or liable for loss or damage to any private property that may be brought to the clubhouse, grounds and premises. Boats are stored at owner's risk.
3. Amendments and changes to House Rules will be posted on the Official Notice Board.
4. While participating in GLSS events and classes, children will be under the supervision of the GLSS. At all other times, children should be under the supervision of their parents or other adults selected by their parents. LGYC assumes no responsibility for the safety of our young people.
5. No pets are allowed in the clubhouse or on the grounds at any time.
6. Members may reserve LGYC facilities for private entertainment. All such reservations should be made with the Operations Manager and are subject to approval of the Executive Committee.
7. Comments and suggestions should be made to the Operations Manager or to any member of the House, Grounds, and Waterfront Committee.

Building

1. The clubhouse is a smoke-free environment.
2. The LGYC telephone is to be used for Yacht Club and Sailing School business only.
3. The office is private and to be used only by Yacht Club and Sailing School officials and Race Committee personnel.
4. Bathing suits may not be worn in the clubhouse. Men shall wear shirts in the clubhouse. Bare feet are not allowed. Hats should not be worn during dinner service in the dining room (carpeted area).
5. No one under the age of 21 will be served alcoholic beverages.
6. No one under the age of 21 without adequate supervision shall be allowed in the bar area while alcoholic beverages are being served.
7. No flammable or toxic liquids may be stored in the clubhouse or other buildings by members or guests.

Grounds

1. All federal, state, county and village ordinances, rules and regulations applying to the use, operation, ownership and safety of boats and equipment shall apply to the waterfront and piers of LGYC.
2. Space available for parking is limited. Please cooperate.
3. Trailers shall be parked in assigned spaces only.
4. Unlicensed motor vehicles are not permitted on LGYC property.
5. Only persons holding a valid driver's license may operate a motor vehicle on the premises.
6. No picnicking shall be allowed on LGYC grounds while the kitchen is open.
7. No alcoholic beverages shall be consumed anywhere on LGYC grounds but the restaurant and bar area during posted hours except for regattas and special social functions.
8. It is in violation of our liquor license for members or guests to bring on the premises or consume on the premises any liquor not purchased from LGYC.
9. All flammable or hazardous materials by necessity present on boats in assigned dry storage spaces must be in proper containers in compliance with

all state and federal regulations. This includes fuel lubricants and batteries. No other flammable, corrosive, or hazardous substances shall be stored on the premises by members or guests.

10. All vessels and equipment shall be removed from the LGYC storage lot and waterfront by November 1 and may not be returned until after April 30, unless arrangements have been made for inside or outside storage with the Operations Manager. To accommodate regattas, members may also be asked to relocate vessels on the property or temporarily completely remove them from the property. Any yacht not so moved may be moved by the LGYC or its agents at the owner's expense and risk incurring storage charges.
11. LGYC is not responsible for members' yachts, equipment, or personal gear of any kind, nor is it responsible for their personal safety.

Property Use Grounds Guidelines

With the increase in membership in the last few years, we have seen an increase in activity around the property. To provide a safe environment for both people and their boats, we are implementing regulations.

- All buildings will be locked utilizing a keypad entry system. All members with boats/trailers will have access to the code to enter buildings.
- Anyone under the age of 16 will require adult permission/supervision to enter buildings 1, 2 and 3.
- Building 4, under the supervision of GLSS, will restrict access but allow Junior and Senior Sailors whose boats are dry stored there to gain access when they intend to sail.
- During off sailing hours when it's dark, all access to the property South of the Club will be off limits to those under the age of 16.
- Those under the age of 16 require permission/supervision to access grounds South of the Club except while passing on the driveway

Waterfront

1. Members shall not block access to the hoists at any time unless they are waiting to launch or come out. Please have crew members on hand to hoist quickly and return vehicle and trailer to their assigned space without delay.
2. After launching, members should move their boats down the pier to make room for others.
3. All skippers are requested to rig their boats and leave the pier area as quickly as possible after launching. When returning, skippers are requested to limit their mooring to the time necessary to de-rig and hoist their boats from the water.
4. No boats may use neighboring piers at any time without special permission from the neighbors.
5. Hoists should be "tied down" when not in use.
6. Power yachts shall use only the windward side of the piers and shall not restrict the sailing yachts in any way.
7. Sails must not be hung on the flagpole. Sails should be attended if spread on the grass.
8. Launching and docking priority shall be given first to racing sailboats, then pleasure sailboats, and then motor boats.
9. Please be aware there is no lifeguard on duty. Swim at your own risk.

Geneva Lake Sailing School

Geneva Lake Sailing School is a non-profit (501c3) organization dedicated to enhancing personal development through teaching the skills of sailing. Using the unique resource of Geneva Lake, we provide the means to advance sailors to their full potential resulting in life-long enjoyment of the sport of sailing and racing. We are committed to creating an atmosphere where sportsmanship, teamwork and competitive spirit can all be enjoyed. GLSS sailors are winners when they try to do their best.

For over 80 years, the Geneva Lake Sailing School has served the community with youth sailing programs that emphasize self-reliance, confidence and teamwork. In recent years GLSS expanded its keel-boat sailing programs to providing sailing opportunities to people of all ages.

Thanks to the state-of-the-art Buddy Melges Sailing Center we can continue our tradition in a modern facility that offers the best learning environment. We are also determined to continuously upgrade our safety equipment; we are currently operating a fleet of new inflatable coach boats equipped with the most up-to-date safety features. With the support of the generous members at the Lake Geneva Yacht Club, GLSS has been able to keep an edge on other local programs not only with our top-notch coaching staff, but our assets as well.

At Geneva Lake Sailing School, we offer various sailing opportunities from ages 4+ with classes ranging from Introduction to Sailing to Advanced Racing. Whether you are looking to dip your toes into the beginning levels of sailing, or are ready to expand your racing expertise, GLSS is the place for you! Below is a list and brief description of all the programs we offer.

Geneva Lake Sailing School Youth Programs

KinderPram (ages 4-6) is an easy introduction to sailing at our lakefront. This unique program is a safe, interactive experience requiring one adult parent or guardian to accompany each student enrolled. Students ride in Prams along with an instructor and engage in land based nautical lessons and games to learn new skills.

Pram Camp (ages 7-11) and **420 Camp** (ages 12-17) are great options for beginner to intermediate level sailors. Students work together to learn and refine points of sail, boat rigging, terminology and basic steering skills.

Opti Camp (ages 8-11) Opti Camp is a beginner/intermediate level sailing course for kids who have completed Pram Camp, or a similar program, start sailing Optimist Dinghies on their own and learn how to steer all points of sail to master going around a simple triangle course. After the completion of this course the sailors will be ready to continue in either the Optimist Learn to Race program or join the Youth Reachers.

Youth Reachers (ages 8-12) and **Teen Reachers** (ages 13-18) are intermediate to advanced level classes designed for students that are looking for adventure. Racing rules are introduced but the focus is on fun while building lifelong sailing skills. A variety of boats are used in the class including the Open Bic, 420, Sonar, Windsurfers, and even Paddle Boards.

Optimist Learn to Race (ages 8-13) takes over where Opti Camp leaves off. It is the perfect next step for young sailors who are interested in learning the fundamentals of racing and get ready to join the Optimist Race Team. Coaching is provided at regional regattas.

Club 420 Spinnaker Class (ages 12-17) is a course for those sailors who have completed our 420 Camp and want to learn the fundamentals of racing. This program is also great for sailors who have aged or sized out of Optimists. The Club 420 is a two-person boat that offers a chance to learn how to use a symmetrical spinnaker.

Optimist Race Team (ages 8-15) is a summer-long advanced sailing program offering a positive team setting where young sailors can learn and apply advanced racing skills. Our curriculum stresses advanced boat handling, sail trim, techniques, race strategy and tactics. Drills both on and off the water will prepare sailors for local regattas where we will provide coaching.

X Boat Race Team (ages 8-16) is a classic summer-long program which offers racers daily challenges through drills, lessons, social camaraderie and competition from club and regatta racing. X boat racing curriculum stresses advanced boat handling and sail trim techniques, race strategy and tactical introductions and sportsmanship.

Singlehanded Race Team (ages 12-18) is a program is created for those sailors who want to experience the thrill of sailing in a high-performance boat. Open to Melges 14 and ILCA (formerly Laser) classes, the Singlehanded race team is an opportunity to get together and sail in a safe and structured environment with emphasis on fun and getting better. The ILCA and Melges 14 sailing platforms with 3 different sized sails allow for the power of the boat to adjusted to conditions and weight of the students as they progress. Sailors must provide their own boat for this course.

Melges 15 program (ages 9-17) is our newest offering that sprang from an immediate success of the M15 “Boat of the Year”. The doublehander with asymmetrical spinnaker is quickly taking over and it became an official ILYA class in just a couple of years since introduction. GLSS Melges 15 program will cater to youth sailors, providing lessons on Thursdays and Fridays. The Sailing School has purchased 6 M15s to support those sailors who do not own the boat. The fleet will also be available for charter for LGYC races and selected regattas.

GLSS Adult and Family Sailing Opportunities

Women on the Water (WOW) is a new program that launched in 2018 to get women with any type of sailing experience on the water racing. WOW participates in the LGYC Thursday Night Race Series in Sonars. In 2020 the WOW program expanded to offer training for novice sailors and racing teams alike.

Geneva Lake Sailing Tour is a three-hour sail, skippered by one of our experienced sailing instructors. You are welcome to try as a skipper or crew, or you can simply sit back and enjoy the ride on our beautiful lake. The choice is yours! The time will also include rigging and basic sailing terminology. Families with children are welcome as well. GLSS members including the LGYC members who have not opted out of the GLSS monthly contribution, are eligible for a 10% discount of the Lake Tour.

US Sailing Basic Keelboat Certification is broken into either two full weekends or nine individual classes. This is a complete course for anyone interested in a comprehensive course to learn how to sail with confidence. Following US Sailing's curriculum and taught by a certified US Sailing Keelboat instructor, this is a 27-hour course. Each session is documented in an official US Sailing Logbook.

Boat Charters are for skippers with a keelboat certification or verifiable sailing resume. Sailors can charter our Sonar for a sail on the lake. Families with children are welcome. GLSS members including the LGYC members who have not opted out of the GLSS contribution, are eligible for a \$50 discount off the Sonar charter.
